From the Ground Up

It has been 26 years since the hundred-day genocide ripped through Rwanda. The massacre tore children from their mothers and cost nearly one million Rwandans their lives and even more their futures. Women make up the majority of survivors of the Rwandan genocide, and their steadfastness in the face of such daunting conflict represents a fraction of their strength. They were going to be the ones to pull their country forward, and we knew they needed global support. So, we teamed up with them. In 1997, Women for Women International-Rwanda was founded in Kigali. With little more than a handful of staff, a network of early and dedicated supporters, and a vision for something greater than what was, Women for Women International-Rwanda established itself as a stronghold of women and a pillar of our organization's force for change.

Over the course of several years, Women for Women International–Rwanda blossomed into a program in eleven districts and a cornerstone of the communities that it served. Now, after reaching nearly 80,000 Rwandan women, partnering with the national government to establish the Urugo Women's Opportunity Center, and weaving a support network that reaches every corner of the country, Women for Women International–Rwanda is bounding toward the next great step.

Charting the Course: Antoinette Uwimana, Country Director

I joined the team six years ago when my country was in its most formative years. Following the genocide, for years, millions of women suffered lack of food and medicine and bore the burden of intense psychological and sexual trauma. Since Women for Women International—Rwanda was founded in Kigali, we have lengthened and deepened our training to include Village Savings and Loans Associations, formed a training-to-job pipeline with local private businesses including a large hotel chain, built a safe and peaceful community for women and their loved ones, and created lasting bonds with our national government.

There will always be more steps to take, and we're prepared to take them in stride. In the coming years, Women for Women Rwanda will begin looking into how to enroll younger women and teenage mothers and will research potential relationships with local NGOs.

What we do is bring hope to the families of our participants. This transition is an opportunity to continue the legacy we have been building for 23 years.

A Companion for Life

As we have from the very beginning, we will continue to support Women for Women Rwanda's growth and see that they have everything they need to be everything they can be. Between 2021 and 2023, we want to contribute \$1,697,000 to Women for Women Rwanda. This will help continue the core program with 300 graduates and 300 new enrollments each year, as well as provide staffing and cover other direct costs.

As they take this momentous leap, Women for Women Rwanda will need unprecedented support and they'll need it before the end of this year so they can begin 2021 with confidence and momentum. Today, at the intersection of so many pivotal international moments, Women for Women Rwanda shines through as a beacon

for a hopeful future. They'll always be part of our beginning, a companion for life in the fight for gender equality; now, they have created a future for themselves with boundless potential.

As they prepare to make this leap, we have a question for you: Will you invest today in the future of Women for Women Rwanda?
